#### President's Message March 2021

**S**pring is just around the corner and jet boating season is upon us. I have been able to have my boat in the water several times already and hope to be out at least once a week this year.

The Chili Run was a great success again with fifteen boats on the pre-run and seventeen boats on the run day. That's thirty-two round trips and I only heard of a couple of rock bumps; we're getting better.

One of the biggest highlights of the New Year's run and the Chili run was gathering food donations to take to the Melba Senior Center. I met with Michelle, the manager, as well as one of her helpers, the Tuesday afterwards and what an eye opener that was. The Center also runs a food bank and they supply food items for 300 to 400 families each month. The center gets no financial assistance from the city and relies on donations to provide support. Many struggling families are ending up in the smaller communities, some homeless and some living with friends or relatives. Michelle said they go to the Meridian food bank at least twice weekly and any food stores around the valley that may give donations.

The Western Whitewater Association was able to donate 200 pounds of food along with \$100 in cash. The Melba Senior Center was so thankful that we made the effort to help their community.

At the Glenn's Ferry Run we are gathering food donations to help support that community. I am challenging everyone to bring a nice donation, as I would like for us to give good support to families in need. Our organization is all about family so everyone dig deep and make this a great success. The donations will be dropped off Sunday after the run.

Hope everyone got the permits they wanted for Hells Canyon; it should be a great year for boating as the snow pack is good this year. I saw that Brundage had 101 inches at the summit.

**W**e are planning our runs as normal and hope to get back to some regular meetings later this spring.

#### **Legislative Update**

In congress now - Omnibus Land Bill HR 803 which will create 1.5 million acres of Wilderness in California, Oregon, Washington and Arizona and many hundreds of miles of Wild and Scenic Rivers has passed the House and is going to the Senate.

Salmon – Challis National Forest Plan Revision is now at least one year away from restart and/or future development as the new administration transitions into operation.

These booklets are also available through Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation and some boat sales locations.

Note – This self-guided training, upon completion, offers a safety card that is recognized for boat operation in Oregon waters, (at this time).

#### Planning to Boat in Oregon this year?

Please note that the state of Oregon modified their boating laws in 2020. Visiting boaters are no longer exempted from the requirement to have boating education. All boaters, regardless of residency, must demonstrate proof that they have completed a boating safety course.

Oregon will accept the Idaho boating course and boater education card. Idaho Department of Parks & Recreation offers three ways to get a card, see:

#### **River Connections**

I would like to introduce the WWA members to an interesting person who many of us have met but did not know her life story or her connection to the Salmon River.

Marjorie Matiska, recently passed at the age of 96 years young. She lived in Whitebird, Idaho for most of her life and waited tables at Hoots Café in Whitebird for thirty years, retiring in 2002 (she started there when she was 48). She lived on Peely Bar, which is below the high overlook (SH95), downstream from Skookumchuck Creek and just upstream from what is commonly known to steel head fishermen as the "haystack hole". She lived there on a 99 year lease from the BLM until her well went bad and she decided to cancel her lease and moved to Camas Prairie to be near her daughter.

What is also interesting is that her maiden name was Lyons and her father ran a ferry at Lyons Ferry downstream from Whitebird Creek (near the end of the road down the east side of the river) and later at Hammer Creek. It must have been interesting times to see the evolution of "progress," in the canyon. If you wish to read her obituary look up Marjorie Matiska in the February 10, 2021, Idaho County Free Press. Memorial services are planned for June.

From now on, when I go by Lyons' Bar, I will likely remember Marjorie working like a trooper at Hoots Café. Salute to a Salmon River Personality.

#### **Glenns Ferry Boating Tips**

There are three things that come to mind regarding the Glenns Ferry Run, 1) Wind, 2) Moss, and 3) Currents.

- 1) **Wind** If you have been in Southern Idaho for a while you will know that the wind can be strong, steady and cold in the spring and the Glenns Ferry area is not exempt from this climatic situation. When you are on the water it will push on you and create situations in which you may need to "crab" into the wind, (i.e. steer into the wind to achieve your desired route). Mix this maneuver with a meandering stream (and meandering current within that stream) and you will find yourself constantly adjusting controls. You may occasionally find that you are outside of the best route of travel, which brings us to the next two topics. PS more than one boat has received a ding when parking along this river due to wind issues, look for soft places to land (if you are running with the wind) and a helping hand when parking next to another boat.
- 2) **Moss** If you find that your pump has ingested enough moss to effectively stop your forward progress there are typically two things that need to be performed, quickly, before you can safely remove the moss from the intake. A. Stop your engine, the moss that has plugged your intake more than likely has also plugged your coolant water line and your engine will over heat soon. B. When you are in the best position you can achieve, (not in a rapid or very strong current) deploy your river anchor attached to your bow ring (never over the gunnel). This will stabilize your position and allow you to work on the plugged intake. Practice the deployment of your anchor and remember that calmer water is the key to making this solution work for you. Once the moss has been cleared from your intake, maybe you can get a tug from one of your fellow boaters to deeper water or you can use your oars and small anchor to move yourself to deeper water to restart the motor. If you are unfamiliar with proper anchor deployment and/or want to practice the process feel free to ask an experienced boater or call me and we can address prior to the run in a "Dry-Dock session". Also look for this topic at the next Skills Day, in June.
- 3) **Currents** The Snake River is famous for its strong and unpredictable currents. Upstream of the King Hill Bridge (note the interesting elevation change on bridge deck, to be saved for a later date). And prior to going under the high freeway bridge you will travel through an area of whirlpool currents and more than likely these will affect the way your boat is handling. This is common but demonstrates the power of these currents and the need to respect them. There is a jetboating phase that comes to mind, "Stay with the current it will define the rock structures below." On this run there are several places where the river spreads out and attention is needed to stay with the current and deeper waters.

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

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


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
